Building Equitable Community Partnerships

ES4SE Technical Assistance Program Evaluation

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The U.S. Department of Energy's Energy Storage for Social Equity (ES4SE) Initiative is designed to help urban, rural, indigenous, and tribal disadvantaged communities address their energy system challenges by considering energy storage technologies and applications as a viable path forward. The two-pronged effort features a Technical Assistance (TA) Program and Project Development and Deployment Assistance (PDDA) Program.

Community-Based TA

- Community needs inform the type of support and solutions
- Program elements designed or iterated collaboratively
- Implementation requires trusting relationships, flexibility, transparency, and responsiveness
- Challenges related to timelines, cultural competency, capacity declines, staff turnover, and changing priorities
- Program evaluation is critical to assess goal attainment, provide accountability, and refine the engagement approach

Evaluation Method

- Survey development
- Statement ranking (54 statements)
- Debriefing interviews (24 people)
- Factor analysis (3 factors)
- Interview analysis
- Narrative explanation

Characterizing Community Assumptions, Experiences, and Needs

Community Consultants

- Relationship and process oriented
- Valued flexibility and holistic support to understand community and needs
- Perceived lack of organizational resources or expertise and requested baseline education
- Desired collaborative project design, without a specific pathway being imposed

"The program was designed to be flexible and responsive" (Statement 06)

Project Specialists

- Efficiency and outcome oriented
- Valued streamlined structure to focus on technical discussions and pathways
- Predefined set of goals and expectations for matching provider and community expertise
- Desired information and resources to meet immediate and specific needs



"I have a concrete vision for what to work on after this program" (S42)

System Navigators

- Authority and outcome oriented
- Valued opportunity to leverage institutional knowledge and authority to direct change
- Perceived challenges and needs as hyper specific to community context
- Desired clarity on local political and economic systems impacting future pathways



"I learned how to better navigate the complexities of my local political and economic landscape" (S49)

Learning From Experience and Planning for the Future

Development

- Introduce provider capabilities and roles
- Communicate data needed from community
- Assign one non-technical point of contact
- Understand existing community partnerships
- Include site visits during project scoping and feasibility assessment

Implementation

- Offer distinct project phases and tracks
- Provide baseline information and education upfront
- Adjust meeting platform, content, and cadence to meet individual community needs
- Identify compensation mechanisms for mutually beneficial work (e.g., travel, speaking, and internships)

Outcomes

- Identify mechanisms to continue engagement beyond TA, such as community-to-community consulting
- Collaborate on and co-author program deliverables
- Provide user guides and resource documentation to ensure knowledge maintenance and transfer
- Outline roadmap of next steps beyond TA
